Board games trace their origins back to 5000 B.C., evolving significantly over millennia. Early games used carved stones and flat sticks painted on one side as dice. Players tossed multiple sticks, and the number of painted sides landing face up determined





their "roll." As technology advanced, sticks were replaced with dice crafted from glass, copper, ivory, marble, and brass. The six-sided die, as we know it today, emerged during the Roman era. Throughout history, board games served various purposes. By 3100 B.C., they were a royal pastime; by 3000 B.C., they became tools for religious teaching. In 1300 B.C., they influenced military strategies, and by 500 B.C., they were integral to childhood play. By 400 A.D., chess had been invented and spread across Europe through Viking exploration. In 1903, Lizzie Magie created The Landlord's Game in the United States, later adapted into the iconic game Monopoly. Euro-style board games, characterized by strategy and indirect competition, began emerging in the 1960s. Their popularity surged in Europe during the 1970s and 1980s, particularly in Germany. These games reached the United States in 1995 with the introduction of The Settlers of Catan, marking a new era in tabletop gaming. From ancient traditions to modern innovations, board games remain a cherished and evolving form of entertainment and connection.
